

# Optimism and Vitality of Life in Green's The Fault in Our Stars: A Corpus Linguistics Perspective

This research explores how corpus-based analysis of the words indicates *optimism* and *vitality* in John Greene's '*The Fault in Our Stars*'. For the required purpose, a corpus of Greene's novel is selected which is analysed with the help of Antconc 3.5.8 software. The words selection has been done by feeding the text onto the Antconc software, and adopting the words with the highest frequencies in terms of clusters and *n-grams*. To accomplish the validity, collocations and colligation trends have also been analysed. The frequencies of words and their excessive use confirm positivity, optimism and vitality that are the distinguished characteristics of John Greene's writing. The study also highlights the usages of words and their resultant effects in Greene's writing style.

Hazel, the central narrator and the protagonist is a sixteen-year-old girl, suffering from a terminal form of thyroid cancer and was confined to breathe with the help of oxygen cylinder and Augustus an 18 years' hero with a removed leg because of cancer. Descriptive qualitative and quantitative designs are used in this study. According to Moleong (2007: 6) the Antconc 3.5.8 is used to elaborate the quantitative corpus-based procedures for authenticity in the research.

John Green's novel *The Fault in Our Stars* as the source material of the study, has been collected and fed to The Antconc 3.5.8. The words showing maximum frequencies are utilized and are used as the tokens-- of optimism and hope. The words having less frequency are ignored by the researcher.

#### 1.1 Research Objectives

The main objectives of the research study are

i. To find out author's evident theme of optimism in his writing through the selection of words



- ii. To help and facilitate the readers through words creating optimism in depressed condition
- iii. To create liveliness among the people who are suffering with miserable diseases

#### 1.2 Research Questions

- i. How does John Greene's selection of words create optimism for people suffering from incurables disease?
- ii. How do dying Gus pursuit a lively life for readers?
- iii. How does Greene inculcate hope in his diseased characters?

#### 2. Literature Review

Having Optimism as a generalized expectancy that smart as opposition dangerous outcomes can typically occur once confronted with issues across necessary life domains (Scheier and Carver, 1985). It's a robust expectation that despite the inevitable setbacks, frustrated incidents and felt experiences gradually seem alright.

Generally, optimism is employed to represent a positive perspective and may be an area of positive scientific discipline. Optimism will be temperamental, that is, some individuals naturally have additional encouraging life, and however at the identical time, it will be conjointly learned with the correct style of experiences.

Explanatorily, optimism is a psychological and mental attribute that individuals experience at specific attire, both positive and negative, or in another sense, the approach individuals mentally justify to happen to them. Dispositional optimism is a degree of expectations that allow smart and fascinating things to occur than dangerous things in the future (Scheier & Carver, 1985). The expectations and hopes are elemental for someone's temperament traits, even some people are biologically more optimistic than demoralized. Pessimistic approach is an associated degree entrenched habit of mind that has sweeping and calamitous consequences: depressed mood, resignation, performance and even unexpectedly poor physical health (Seligman, 1995).

A strategy "defensive pessimism" is utilized by considerate individuals to assist them manage their stress so that they will work fruitfully. Defensive pessimism helps in fighting against the harsh circumstances by the expansion of bravery and courage. Then, the sufferer becomes mentally stable and copes all the dangerous incidents that may occur. Dispositional pessimism, in the similar manner, is a struggle against the thoughts of negative results. Nonetheless, each one of their performances differs. Dispositional pessimism shows less perceived management, which suggests that sufferers are unable to deal properly and



continue the behaviour till the goal is achieved. According to Dr. Jeffery Rossman (2010), dispositional pessimism is the tendency to believe the worst on an identical basis.

Antconc may be a package, multiplatform tool for finishing corpus linguistics analysis and data-driven learning.

## 3. Methodology

In this research, the novel of John Greene is analysed by using mixed (quantitative and qualitative) method. Corpus tool is used in order to show the authenticity of the research. A detailed analysis is being done of the word's frequencies gathered by corpus. After reading some of the works of John Greene, we selected his novel *The Fault in Our Stars* in order to check optimism in the style of the writer. Then re-reading the novel a couple of time the words that are expressing optimist were enlisted. Antconc is being used to check the words



with the highest frequency. The words are put in search term to check concordance. Words getting maximum hits are analysed.

## 3.1 Collection and Interpretation of Data

The data for a corpus analysis text is required to be in machine-readable form. For this research, the text of *The Fault in Our Stars* in xxx. txt format is used as an input data that is fed onto Antconc software. The analysis of the words, which are creating optimism in the novel and their interpretation, go hand in hand. For that reason, both sections of data collection and data interpretations have been placed together. The text of the novel was downloaded in Pdf. File and then was converted into plain text.

Reading the novel "*The Fault in Our Stars* "is the first step for data collection. The data of study is gathered by using documentary technique. It means that the researchers have collected the information by reading, studying and analysing the related theory from specific books and journals related to the object of the study. Researcher has gathered information from text books and internet which are related to the issue in discussion and referred in order to support this study. After reading the novel for several times until its full meaning is understood, the procedure for analysing data is been continued by the following steps:

- i. Identifying the sentences or dialogues that give information about optimism.
- ii. Classifying the words based on the characteristic optimism and pessimism accordingly by Quora (2012).
- iii. Giving the explanations and reasons to conclude the story as the whole.

While reading the text through software, most frequently used words have been observed in order to create optimism. A detailed analysis of the selected words is given below in order to connect their impact for creating optimism.

# 3.2 Okay: A Word Promoting Optimism and Vitality



"That's the thing about pain," "Augustus said, and then glanced back at me". "It demands to be felt." (Chapter 04, page 09).




Figure 6. Concordance of the word "pain" is prominent in the picture below

"God, that is beautiful," "I said mostly to myself". (Chapter 10, page 07).




Figure 8. Concordance of the word "beautiful" is prominent in the picture below

"I thank God for you every day, kid." (Chapter 19, page 3).




Figure 9. Concordance of the word "thanks" is prominent in the picture below

"I'm hopeful I'll get to attend as a ghost", (Chapter 20, page 3).




Figure 10. Concordance of the word "hope" is prominent in the picture below

"When surprised and excited and innocent Gus emerged from Grand Gesture Metaphorically Inclined Augustus," (Chapter 10, page 7).




Figure 12. Concordance of the word "excite" is prominent in the picture below

"He was lucky to enrolled in the trial, they told me." (Chapter 14, page 3).




Figure 13. Concordance of the word "luck" is prominent in the picture below




Figure 14. Concordance of the word "infinite" is prominent in the picture below

"I walked Isaac to a seat in the Circle of Trust then slowly worked my way around the Literal Heart". (Chapter 24, page 1).




Figure 16. Concordance of the word "trust" is prominent in the picture below

## 4. Conclusion
